Model United Nations Assembly is a project organised and sponsored by Rotary Clubs to build international understanding and promote goodwill for world peace.

The students represented Jordan and India during the two-day event. It was evident that they valued the opportunity and enjoyed the event. Christa, Alex, Anshita and Satvik presented their experience to our club members at a meeting in August.

Our members remarked afterwards how wonderful it is to see such vibrant and enthusiastic members of the upcoming generation.








International Report

Sepik River Dental Clinic Project







This year we continued with our one and only international project, establishing a dental clinic in Korogu Village, along the Sepik River, in East Sepik Province, Papua New Guinea.

The clinic will serve an estimated 30,000 - 200,000 people living along the river and inland. These people have currently no access to dental services. Once the clinic is set up, we will organise volunteer dentists from Australia every year and also from other parts of the world through the NGO (Non Government Organisation), Project Sepik, who are our contact and partner in PNG for this project.

What we aim to achieve

- 1. Set up first dental clinic in PNG to serve rural population.
- 2. This clinic will serve as an example to local Provincial Government of what can be achieved with minimal funds.
- 3. Set example for PNG health authorities to adopt operating model for other areas and eventually staff clinic with locally trained dentists.

In 2021 the board approved the project but nothing happened for two years due to Covid restrictions and lack of funds. A committee was then set up to handle the project. The committee members are: Peter Bray (Project Manager), Kathy Bray, Michael O'Connell and Karo Haltmeier.

The committee settled on AUD50,000.00 which needed to be raised to build a very basic two room building, one room for the clinic and the other for the accommodation. The funds are also needed to cover the costs of:

dental chair

dental equipment

generator

water tank

corrugated roofing for the clinic and

accommodation building tools such as hammer, saw, etc.

building materials such as toilet, shower, sink, tables, chairs, bed, nails, etc

Transport of materials from Wewak to the clinic site

fuel for both land and river transportation

Timber for the building frame was donated by the villagers

Our project is registered with RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Services).

First Site Visit October 2023

During this initial site visit the proposed building site was inspected for its suitability and the precise location was agreed with the newly formed Dental Clinic Village Committee. Prior to the first visit timber had already been cut and milled for the timber frame of the building. Steel posts had been sourced by the Dental Clinic Village Committee from a disused building nearby.

Second Site Visit November/December 2023

On the second site visit we cemented-in the steel posts and the frame of the building was put up .



Roofing materials, plywood and window materials were purchased in the closest town and transported by truck and canoe to the village. The construction works continued through December 2023 to February 2024 until materials ran out.

Third Site Visit April/May 2024

A third site visit to the dental clinic at Korogu was conducted from 25 April – 6 May 2024. Construction materials were purchased to close the shell of the clinic building (i.e. flooring, remaining outside wall, windows, stairs). Outstanding bills of previously provided transport services after the second visit were identified and settled.

Materials Purchase A trip was made to the district capital Maprik on 29 April 2024 to purchase CCV treated flooring timber boards and colorbond panels to complete the outside walls. It was decided to clad the front of the building and the



verandah with locally made cladding made of woven sago leaves instead of metal cladding. This will improve the airflow inside the building and is the cheapest option and -last but not least- also provides local employment in the village.

Recruitment of plumber and electrician

A qualified plumber was brought in on 1 May 2024 from the provincial capital Wewak to assess the scope of work and check the inventory of materials against the scope of work. The plumber agreed to install the water supply to sink and the water tanks. He will also arrange a frame for the overhead roof tank to be welded in Wewak at extra cost. It was agreed to pay him for three working days at K100/day plus transport from and back to Wewak.

A qualified electrician was found in a village downstream of Korogu. He visited the work site on 4 May 2024 and agreed to install the 4 fans, 8 lights, 5 light switches and 6 power-points plus associated wiring and the feeder line from the generator shed. 5 working days at 100K/day were agreed plus transport costs.

Next steps

The first priority is to install the flooring and the completion of the side walls of the building. This has to happen to enable the plumbing and electricals to be installed. There will be costs incurred for the canoe transport of the materials and work crew to the clinic site as and when required to complete the before-mentioned works.

Other events

Six earthquakes happened during the visit, two of which on the same day. They were of the magnitude 3 to 4+ category (a good shake) and did not cause any damage. These are still ongoing aftershocks of the big 6.9 magnitude earthquake of 24 March 2024 which caused extensive damage to the houses in the village. 57 houses collapsed initially and another 13 at the first big aftershock two days later.

The wet season is coming to the end and the level of seasonal flooding decreased by about 2 metres during the visit and the village is now more or less on dry ground.



Funds

At the time of writing we have AUD3500 left for the project. This is sufficient to complete the electrical wiring, power supply, the plumbing of the sink and water supply and to close the building shell until we open the new clinic.

Fund-raising

We are still looking for funds to pay for our portable dental equipment. It has been decided to go for the cheapest option available as we cannot afford to purchase from commercial dental equipment vendors in Australia. I have been in Papua New Guinea in the last two months, speaking to companies CEOs seeking funds for the project.

Kathy, Peter, Patrick and I went to Carlingford Rotary Club on Tuesday 21 May and did a presentation on the project.

We were offered two electric dental chairs and we will investigate transportation costs etc.

Volunteer Dentists

We have three confirmed volunteer dentists from Australia 1 from Japan and 1 from Canada.

Vocational Report

Over the last 12 months, we have focused on supporting Domestic violence and Transitional Housing programs.

Many of the Kenthurst Rotarians supported The Hills Winter Sleepout where Over 90 people gathered at Bella Vista Farm to participate in the 10th Hills Winter Sleepout. It wasn't as cold as previous years, but it was wet. This year the event raised a record-breaking \$61,180. The funds raised will be used by HCA's Homelessness Initiative and StreetMed which provides street-level first aid and a food service to the homeless.

Positive Vibes hosted a fashion show raising \$9,000. Monies raised will support the programs of The Hills Women's Shed which is an initiative of the Positive Vibes Foundation. It strives to provide a safe and welcoming space to reduce isolation and promote well-being.

Hills Domestic Violence Awareness and Fundraising evening was held at Rydges Norwest raising \$43,000.

We also supported The Hills Relay for Life, a great community event raising funds and awareness about cancer

It's great to be a Kenthurst Rotarian and I look forward to helping support our community again this coming year as we all strive to supply more homes for older women in our community who have become homeless through no fault of their own as they leave domestic violence.



Since November 2024 Website rebuild started in July – analytics started in November 2023

- 1121 Visitors
- 956 Visitors from Australia
- 77 Visitors of the USA
- 9 Visitors from Japan



All club events are now being posted to social media within a week – more frequent updates mean more visitors. There has been no paid advertising for our website (however we have enjoyed some spinoff from our Social Media Advertising).



Conversion of the Kenthurst Rotary page from a "Person Page" to a "Business Page" required manually loading all the historical posts to the new page. Unfortunately, all our previous followers could not be moved to the new page. Hundreds of invites were sent, and we managed to get about 100 of our old followers to follow the new site. We have now built this up to 273 followers because of the regular posting of all club events and meeting visitors. As a result of the move to a business site, we have the ability to monitor our users and their demographics.



Facebook & Instagram Advertising of our events

We have spent a total of \$735 in paid advertising for 2023 Kenthurst Fair & 2023 Carols in the Park, that resulted in 65,213 impressions for 31.020 unique visitors – these were all targeted to the events demographics and generally within 10 kilometres of John Benyon Rotary Park. In terms of 'bang for buck' it has cost .023 cents per unique target visitor.

Club Photography

With my trusty assistant photographer (Elizabeth) we have taken well over 3000 photos of club events many are posted on the Rotary website, social media and local papers. Key visitors and people assisting the club (e.g. RAAF personnel that formed the Catafalque Party) have been supplied with photos of their involvement.
